A Rainbow Rises Out Of Africa Tragedy

When I was in Africa for three months, teaching pastors and bishops, on only one occasion did I have any disagreement in a session. It was at Bungoma, and two pastors objected to the teaching to the extent that the others objected to their interruptions. But one of those pastors, Rev. Shikuku, later attended the large and highly successful meeting in Rongo in September, 2017, and there spoke with me on the phone that he now believed in Bride truth. But little did he know what the price for that decision would be. I will let him tell his story, but for the last two months he has been isolated to living in a hospital because he was unable to pay the bill. That's the way it is in much of Africa—you have to stay there until your bill is paid. You will understand more as you read his two emails he sent to me. Also, Bishop Aladwa is mentioned here, who is the bishop who threatened Constable Rubben, Caleb, and me, addressed in the April 14 and May 6 "Gary Reports."

Shalom Gary,

This is Rev. Shikuku from Bungoma. Gary, I am sincerely sorry for the negative campaign we did about the Bride Church in Kenya. I did not kill anyone physically, but I killed from my heart. I can't continue living in isolation, but God has saved me and I am reformed and have been advancing Bride teachings and interest in my region. I have communicated this to Caleb, and now am doing so to you.

Brother Gary, I went through a rough time in my life. Just because I turned against Bishop Aladwa and many pastors who planned to kill Caleb and destroy the Bride Church, before they were arrested some months back they organized a gang who came and hacked me and my wife in the house using machetes, and killed two of my three children. I have been in the hospital for a long time and today am happy Caleb is visiting me here. I want to be part of the revival team to expand the Bride work if it happens that I get out of the hospital.

Gary, I am happy the killers are in the prisons.

And upon his bill being paid and him being released from the hospital that same day, Shikuku wrote to me:

Gary,

I am out of the hospital. Thank you for sending Caleb and his team to come visit me in the hospital and discharge me.

My wife has been living at the chief camp before the demonic Bishop Aladwa was taken to prison. The villagers told me some of his relatives set my house on fire and it was burned to ashes. But all in all, I am safe with my wife now.

Brother Gary, I resisted your teachings not because they were wrong, but I did it because we were jealous of your work of the Bride and feared our churches collapsing from members joining the Bride church. I worked with many pastors to do harm to Caleb, Rubben, and Timothy [the lawyer and his wife who were shot] because they were the people who were propagating the expansion of the Bride's work. But I am changed and am going to work with equal effort that I used to bring the Bride work down, but it failed.

And I want you to know that because you provided the finances to make all of this possible, you are just as much a part of this rich and valuable success. Without your support, this could not have happened. Rev. Shikuku's release from the hospital and their ongoing journeys all across Kenya are made possible by your faithful participation. If we all do our individual parts, then there is hope that Immanuel will indeed return. This is in fact our goal and our purpose. Those in Africa have gone so far as to pay the ultimate price with their lives for this work, and I hope you will do your part as well.
